

DOUBLE CRESTED CORMORANTS

On June 5, 2020, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) announced the publication of a <u>draft environmental impact</u> <u>statement (EIS)</u> and <u>draft rule</u> inviting <u>public comment</u> on proposed management of conflicts associated with double-crested cormorants. As part of the continued effort to address conflicts between cormorants and wild and publicly stocked fisheries, and aquaculture facilities, the draft EIS evaluates alternatives within the Service's authority to implement measures that address conflicts associated with cormorants within the contiguous 48 United States.

The Service developed the draft EIS in cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture, Wildlife Services. The draft EIS evaluates five separate alternatives. In all analyzed alternatives in the draft EIS (except the no action alternative), maximum allowable take would be authorized up to 123,157 cormorants per year, nationally. This is an increase of maximum allowable take, compared to 2017-2020. This proposed level of authorized take was developed using a Potential Take Limit model, which allows the Service to integrate biological and policy considerations into the decision-making process of authorizing the take of cormorants to manage conflicts.

The draft EIS also identifies a preferred alternative, which would establish a new permit option under 50 CFR part 21 (special double-crested cormorant permit). This proposed special permit would be available to state and tribal wildlife agencies in the contiguous 48 United States to manage conflicts specifically associated with double-crested cormorants on state or tribal-managed lands. This preferred alternative is reflected in the draft rule that accompanies the draft EIS. Under this proposed new permit, the Service would authorize states and tribal wildlife agencies to conduct lethal take of cormorants on lands within their respective jurisdictions. A new special permit for interested states and tribes would complement existing measures to address conflicts with cormorants to protect human health and safety, personal property and threatened and endangered species.

The <u>draft rule</u> and <u>draft EIS</u> are available for <u>public comment</u> for 45 days. The comment period ends on July 20, 2020. <u>Comments on both documents may be submitted by commenting through the regulations.gov portal for this proposed rulemaking.</u> Additional information about this rulemaking process can be found on the Service's special website, <u>Expanding Management of Conflicts Associated with Double-crested Cormorants.</u>

After the 45-day comment period, the alternatives and impact analysis may be changed as a result of the comments received during this review. The Service would then publish a final EIS and document a final decision in a Record of Decision that is published in the Federal Register.

MINUTES - 2019 Meeting

HLPOA ANNUAL MEETING - August 3, 2019

The meeting was called to order at 8:35 after a 30 minute social time. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Dave Baker introduced the current Board Members that were in attendance: Dave Baker, President, Rob Saunders, Vice President, Michele Buttweiler, Treasurer. Sue Peterson, the Secretary was absent. Also, the following Directors were introduced: John Buttweiler, Pam Heller, and Teresa Weihs. Bob Kalton, the Past President was also introduced.

<u>Dave Baker</u> reviewed the 2018/2019 accomplishments with the most important being a continued focus on AIS inspection at our boat landing resulting in no invasive species being detected on Horseshoe. He also discussed our Facebook presence which is only accessible to dues paying members. We currently have 170 Facebook members. Dave believes with Facebook and our email system, our communication among our members has been heightened.

Chad Sherak of the DNR then spoke on various water quality issues:

- -7% of area lakes have invasive species, of which 3% are Zebra mussels.
- Zebra mussels in this area originated on Ossawinnamakee-Large lakes with a lot of boat traffic lead to susceptible to unwanted species being transported to Horseshoe.
- -Of particular concern of late is private Dock Service Providers who transport docks from one lake to another.
- -Permits are required for swim rafts and platforms, weed rollers, Aqua Jets, etc.

He then answered many questions regarding float planes, Bass fishing tournaments, decontamination sites, weed eradication, removal of vegetation, wake zones, and allowance of signage in bay areas as it pertains to fishing during nesting and spawning times. A vote was called on whether the attendees were in favor of requesting the DNR to reinstate signage in the West bay area that once existed, but that the DNR is thinking of removing from the fishing ban list during spawning areas. The group unanimously voted to have it reinstated. Discussion was then held regarding the East bay on buoys and No Wake Zones. Dave suggested this be a topic as the upcoming board meeting.

Rob Saunders next reviewed the By-laws changes that were explained to be a cleanup of who is an eligible voter, who is eligible for Board Member seat and their terms. The area designations (i.e. East, West, etc.) were removed from the 6 Director slots, allowing for easier recruitment. It was noted that committee members should attend all Board Meetings. Rob motioned approval, all agreed with one exception. The motion was seconded by Dale Johnson.

Michele Buttweiler reviewed current financial position of Horseshoe Lake noting that we began the year with \$9,987.49 in Cash and \$46,486.00 in CD's. For this past fiscal year (Aug 1, 2018 - July 31, 2019), we took in \$12,758.15 in revenues, and spent \$8,198.48. About \$7,000 of the income is from dues, and \$3,260 came in from additional lake protection donations. Membership sign income was \$1,340. Our largest expense is AIS Inspection costs of \$3,850. The other costs include meeting expenses, postage and mailing, newsletter expense and other miscellaneous lake items including buoys, etc. If any member would like a copy of the Financial Report, they should email their request to Michele.

Chad Boeckmann discussed communications:

- Website and auto email system are in and functioning well.
- 80% open rate for emails.
- -90% of membership signed up for email communications of newsletter and other news which decreases labor and costs.
- -History of Newsletter in on the website allowing archiving availability.
- -Horseshoelakemn.org is the website. He welcomes comments, suggestions....

<u>Dale Johnson</u> reported on Water Quality and noted the following clarity measurements:

May, 2019 West 19 ft

July, 2019 West 18 ft

East 23.5 ft

East 15 ft

All tests show negative for zebra mussels

Kevin Max discussed Fish Mgmt:

- -The lake is not being actively stocked for walleye.
- -We want northerns out of the lake catch and keep.
- -Still can only keep 10/per person still slot issues.
- -Cormorant hunt was May 21st with Breezy Point and area associations: 388 came out 225 previous year.
- -Kevin unveiled the new sign that is being put at the landing that highlights where boats can be cleansed.

<u>Dave Baker</u> touched on Public Access AIS Monitoring that we to date had utilized 300 hours, with 200 hours left to use by season's end.

Pam Heller discussed driveway signs and how to obtain them. She noted the cost of \$20, with \$10 going to the lake protection fund.

Kevin Max awarded the Laurence Family the Boat Parade Plaque as the 2019 Boat Parade Winners. He mentioned we are currently seeking a Commodore (family) for 2020 Parade.

Teresa Weihs discussed Horseshoe Lake Memorabilia and explained the process of ordering.

Bob Kalton noted that August 31st is the Fishing Contest/Pot Luck at Mission Park and encouraged all to attend.

Special guest Gordon Hinson shared his knowledge of the history of Huxtable Point revolving around the Swanson family.

The meeting was then adjourned.

BOATING RULES

There have been some issues on our lake lately regarding jet skiers harassing wildlife and coming too close to other watercraft. This is a friendly reminder that the lake is to be enjoyed by all, safely and responsibly. Please remind your guests and family to observe the rules!

Personal watercraft are considered motorboats under the law so they must follow all the regulations that govern other motorboats. In addition, personal watercraft...

- Are required to have a rules decal (provided at no charge by the DNR) in full view of the operator.
- Operators and passengers must wear a U.S. Coast Guard approved Type I, II, III, or V personal flotation device (life vest).
- > Are required to carry a USCG approved fire extinguisher.
- Must travel at slow-no wake speed (5 mph or less) within 150 feet of: shore (except when a PWC is launching or landing a water skier by the most direct route to open water), docks, swimmers, swimming rafts, any moored or anchored watercraft, or non-motorized watercraft.
- While towing a person on water skis or other device, must have an additional person onboard to act as observer.
 Wide-angle rearview mirrors may be substituted for an observer but they must be factory-installed or specified by the PWC manufacturer.
- Cutoff lanyards must be properly used and attached to the person, life vest or clothing of the operator.
- May only operate between 9:30 am and one hour before sunset.
- You may not ...
- Chase or harass wildlife.
- Operate while facing backward.
- Operate in a way that endangers life, limb or property.
- Operate a personal watercraft if the spring-loaded throttle mechanism has been removed or tampered with so it interferes with the return-to-idle system.
- Weave through congested watercraft traffic or jump the wake of another craft within 150 feet of the other boat.
- Travel through emergent or floating vegetation at greater than a slow-no wake speed.

MICROPLASTICS ON MINNESOTA LAKES


Microplastics are very small plastic particles, less than 5 millimeters (or 1/20th of an inch) in size. They come from common items such as degraded plastic bags, synthetic clothes and textiles, some hygiene products, and cigarette filters. They are found across terrestrial, aquatic, and marine environments worldwide. It is speculated to negatively impact the aquatic environments and ecosystems. However, it is not known with certainty where these particles are in aquatic environments. Research is currently being done to learn how much and what kinds of microplastics are found in four Minnesota sentinel lakes: Peltier, Elk, White Iron, and Ten Mile.

Additionally, the research project is designed to engage community members in part of the research process, and communicate about microplastics and project results. So far, plastics have been found in the waters and on the bottom of the lake in the sediment of all four study lakes. In the fall of 2020, researchers will begin dissecting two types of fish to see if there are any plastics in their guts: 1) filter feeders (cisco) and 2) visual feeders (bluegill and perch). Fish will be collected by the research team and also by community members who are interested in collaborating on the project. Anglers can submit fish stomachs throughout the year for research staff to dissect and analyze for any microplastic consumption. LAKE STEWARD PROGRAM

We all love our lakes and work to protect them. This spring an MLR member, Dorothy Whitmer, contacted Jeff Forester with a program she had started for her lake association, the Gull Chain of Lakes Association, GCOLA. This will be a statewide effort.

Dorothy's program, called <u>Lake Stewards</u> gets owners to educate themselves by using the "<u>Score Your Shore Mini-Assessment</u>." Then Dorothy and her partners support the owners with resources so that they can make improvements. Those who have a shoreline with 75% native cover up to 25 feet from the water receive a beautiful Lake Stewards (below) sign that honors the owner's work and encourages and educates others on the lake to restore or preserve their native shoreline.



In this short and informative <u>webinar</u> Dorothy Whitmer lays out the specifics of the <u>Lake Stewards Program</u> that has been so successful on the Gull Lake chain of lakes. To learn more about the program, and how you can start such a program on your lake, click the link and watch the webinar.

The Lake Steward program is simple and effective. It not only helps to protect water quality, but change the culture to build a community of Lake Stewards on the lake.

Watch the webinar. Then <u>contact Dorothy</u> to start a Lake Stewards program on your lake. It is fun, easy and will have significant impact.


BOAT PARADE

Sumertime and the Livin' is Easy!

These hot days call for easy, patio dining. Here's a favorite summertime shore dinner for family or guests: BASS WITH HEIRLOOM TOMATOES AND GARDEN GREEN BEANS

(Serves 4)

3 tbsp vegetable oil

1-2/ pounds bass filets (skin on)

1/4 tsp Dijon mustard

1 tbsp juice from green grapes

1 tbsp chopped herbs (parsley, chives, basil)

Salt and pepper to taste

3 tbsp olive oil


4 mixed heirloom tomatoes cut in quarters

8 ounces of green beans blanched

2 radishes thinly sliced

1 shallot sliced lengthwise

1 tbsp black olives, crushed



Preheat oven to 350 degrees

Place a large saute' pan over high heat. Add the vegetables oil and season the fish on both sides with salt. Place fish filets in pan skin side down and lower heat to medium. Cook for 2-3 minutes until golden brown. Add butter to pan and baste for 30 seconds. Place fish in oven for 5 minutes and then allow fish to rest for 2-3 minutes. In a small bowl stir together the mustard, herbs and salt and pepper. Slowly add the olive oil to make a vinaigrette. Set aside. Combine tomatoes, beans and radishes in another bowl. Add vinaigrette and let sit for 2-3 minutes. To serve: put tomato mixture on individual plates and add fish on top. Garnish with herbs and black olives.
