I have been a board member for the past ten years and a homeowner on Horseshoe for twenty-nine years. This is significant because families that have dwelled here are passionate about the condition and eco-system of our beautiful lake. It is a legacy of our past and an acknowledgement to the future. It is why HLPOA exists. Our lake quality is important for our upcoming generations, enabling them to enjoy what we have now. Although we have limited powers, we do have influence with the Township, County, DNR and Police/Fire Departments.

Our management functions include:

- Placing buoys each spring and removing them in the Fall
- Coordinating AIS inspectors with the County to assure our lake is monitored for invasive species
- Performing clarity readings and other testing of the water quality
- Checking for invasive plant life to our shorelines
- > Monitoring the nesting of loons and other wild birds
- Controling the cormorants on our waters
- > Promoting the enjoyment of our lake for residents and guests

We also foster the social side of Horseshoe with our Annual Fourth of July Parade, Fireworks, and the Children's Fishing Contest/Labor Day Picnic. The Annual Meetings in August recap the accomplishments of the year and induct new officers and Committee Members.

Think about participating in the protection and enjoyment of our lake through the HLPOA. Keep your membership active by completing your dues statement (attached). We welcomed three new Board Members in August: Judy Deis, Nancy Jones and Diane Wiener. Chad, Kevin and Jim continue to serve as Board Members. 

We continued to have another successful year with inspections. We utilized close to 500 hours of inspector time at our landing. (May thru September). DNR and Crow Wing funds paid for our first 300 hours, with additional hours covered by HLPOA. (Approx \$3,000) We believe having more qualified inspectors and adding a port- a- pot made it more desirable for a constant supply of inspectors. We also hope to fill in the potholes at the public access area and have the DNR improve the ramp.

Bear Alert!


If bears are in the area (and there have been sightings) let your neighbors, homeowners and fellow campers know about it so everyone keeps potential attractants away from bears. Together we can reduce conflicts with bears and avoid teaching them bad habits. The bears are typically shy and flee when encountered, but they are bolder when natural foods are in short supply. People are asked not to try and pet bears or approach them. While injuries due to bears are rare, people should still be cautious. The state of Minnesota does not have bear relocation program because rangers say it does not resolve the underlying issue, which is food sources left out by humans. Relocated bears often return or become a problem elsewhere if they are relocated.

Here is a full list of ways to avoid bear conflicts:

- ✓ Store garbage in bear-resistant garbage cans or dumpsters. Keep garbage inside a secure building (not a screened porch) until the morning of pickup.
- ✓ If there is not a secure building to put bear attractants in, erect an energized fence around trash or any other item attractive to bears (e.g., fruit trees, animal feed, gardens and compost piles).
- ✓ When camping, pack out trash, dispose of it properly, and store food in bear-resistant containers or in a locked vehicle or camper.
- ✓ If you wish to feed birds, hang birdfeeders 10 feet up and 4 feet out from the nearest trees. Use a rope and pulley system to refill birdfeeders, and clean up spilled seeds daily.

Simmered and Savory

Now that the weather is cooling down and Autumn is here, it might be time to dust off some soup and stew recipes that have been on hiatus since Spring. Here is an easy and "comfort food" recipe that is hearty and filling for busy weeknight dinners. Add some honey/butter cornbread, a fruit salad and you have a winner. Best of all it features our Minnesota wild rice that is healthy and nutritious.

Minnesota Cream of Wild Rice Soup



3/12 cups chicken broth
1 cup diced carrots
1/2 cup celery
1/3 cup wild rice
1/3 cup sliced onion
½ tsp dried thyme
2 tbsp butter
3 tbsp flour
1 cup Half and Half cream
2 cups cut up cooked chicken

Mix broth, carrots, celery, uncooked rice, onions, thyme and dash of pepper. Bring to a boil and simmer one hour until the rice is tender. Melt the butter and stir in the flour, then slowly add the half and half. Stir for one minute and then add the cream mixture to the rice mixture stirring constantly. Gently add in the chicken and heat through. Ladle into bowls and serve with a sprinkling of parsley. Yield: 4 servings and 341 calories per serving. It also freezes well.

Ready for Fall and Winter?

Outside Duties

- Clean and store <u>boats</u>, dock ornaments, ladder, life jackets and ski equipment.
- Mow the lawn one last time (if you have a lawn at your place).
- Clean and winterize lawnmower and other gas-powered yard equipment.
- Rake and remove leaves within at least 30 feet from your cabin.
- Store fire pit decorations, emptied flower pots, drained hoses and sprinklers, and deflated water toys.
- Look for air leaks around electrical wiring, dryer vents, pipes, windows and doors; then seal leaks with caulk or insulation to keep out cold air and pests.
- Insulate pipes in crawl spaces by wrapping them with heat tape or thermostatically- controlled heat cables; also open cabinet doors to allow heat to get to un-insulated pipes under sinks and appliances near exterior walls.
- Clean out gutters, and inspect roof for shingles that are raised or cracked; leaking roofs and clogged gutters can lead to significant water damage.
- Take in dock and boat hoists. Remove hoist motor and electric line.
- Turn off outside pump breaker, hoist motor breaker, dock light breaker.
- Store outdoor furniture, picnic tables and hammocks.
- Make sure your winter sports gear is ready to go. Snowmobile and ATV tuned up? Skis waxed? Where are those snowshoes?

Inside Duties

- Ensure that the power and water are in the proper mode for vacancy.
- Set thermostat at the appropriate temperature for the region. If you heat your place in the winter, set the thermostat no lower than 55 degrees.
- Clean furnace filter to maintain an efficient heating and cooling system and reduce the risk of fire.
- If you're shutting off the refrigerator, leave the door cracked open to prevent musty smells from developing. Also, unplug computers and major appliances.
- Pull shades, or cover furniture to keep it from being bleached by the sun.
- · Put dryer sheets near linens.
- · Restock and store first-aid kit.
- Take out all perishable foods; store those that remain in air-tight/critter-tight containers. If you don't heat the cabin
 in winter, carry out canned goods so they don't freeze.
- Turn off dehumidifier and hot water heater.
- Close damper for <u>fireplace</u>. Seal box to prevent critters from entering cabin.
- If you don't heat in winter, drain the pipes by attaching a hose to the lowest point in the plumbing, then blow out all water with an air compressor.
- Winterize washing machine; kitchen appliances.
- Do a final cleaning of indoor space
